Blue Heron to Lead One-Week Cruise Before Labor Day to Wye River, St. Michaels, Annapolis

As detailed in the yearbook, *Blue Heron* will lead a one week cruise leaving Saturday, August 27th with an ultimate destination of Annapolis on Saturday,

September 3rd. Anyone wishing to leave Friday September 2nd and join us just for the weekend in Annapolis is of course welcome.

We will arrive in St. Michaels on Tuesday, August 30th and have a lay day there on Wednesday. We suggest that those who are sustaining members of the Calvert Marine Museum may want to make reservations for docking at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum since they offer reciprocal privileges (410-745-2916). I have tentatively made reservations for six boats. Please let me know ASAP if you wish to dock there.

SMSA has offered this Labor Day cruise for several years and, although the moorings in Spa Creek are on a first-come, first-served basis, we have found that by anchoring in Whitehall Bay Friday night we can arrive at the moorings about 10-11 am Saturday morning when some boats are leaving and others still have not arrived. Check out time for overnight moorings is noon. The moorings before the Spa Creek bridge are limited to boats under 45', beyond the bridge to boats under 35'. The overnight cost is \$25 and that includes use of the showers. There can also be some slips available for \$2/ft. See <http://www.annapolis.gov/info.asp?page=1320> for more details.

Directly across the street from Fawcetts is the Annapolis Summer Garden Theater. Their final show of the season, "A Chorus Line," will be the Saturday evening we are there. The cost is \$12 for seniors, \$15 for adults and reservations should be made in advance at (410) 268-9212 with payment when the tickets are picked up. See <http://www.summergarden.com/> for more details. While underway during the cruise, *Blue Heron* will monitor channels 9 and 16. We will check in with the fleet at 10:00, noon, 14:00 and 16:00 on channel 9 and then switch to channel 71. After reaching our destination we will try to remember to turn on our cell phone (410) 474-9179!

We hope you will join us on this rather leisurely cruise. Please let us know in advance if you plan to join us but be advised that we will be out of town

from August 1st through August 22nd and will not be able to respond directly during that period.

Returning to Our Past on the Chesapeake Bay Water Trail

Kalypso and skipper, Fred Siesseger, recently retraced the first exploration of the Chesapeake Bay by Captain John Smith (June 2-July 21, 1608), logging 1081 miles. *Kalypso* was the first boat to complete this voyage based on a daily itinerary developed by a group of eminent colonial historians for the National Park Service. Edward Haile Wright, author of the "Jamestown Narratives", also provided valuable period information and contacts around the Bay for *Kalypso's* skipper. Under pending legislation, this route will become part of the Chesapeake Bay Water Trail. *Kalypso* will soon begin Smith's second exploration of the Bay (July 24-September 7, 1608) of 1119 miles to complete the Water Trail voyage.

Replicas of Smith's 30-foot boat, called a shallop, are currently under construction at the maritime museums in Reedville and Chestertown, in preparation for educational programs during the quatercentenary of Jamestown's founding in 2007. The shallow draft wooden shallop has oars and a rudimentary rig for downwind sailing.

Having made ample use of *Kalypso's* iron genny and weathered several storms during his voyage, *Kalypso's* skipper is now in awe of the dozen poor blokes who rowed and faced the hostile elements (including some native Americans) in an open boat. Even more impressive is the fact that Smith was not even a sea captain. (He earned his title earlier by successively beheading three Turks in personal combat while opposing armies watched during a Hungarian city siege). Yet, beginning the 1608 voyage in his diminutive shallop with only a barrel of water, some worm-eaten ship biscuits and a

compass, he navigated into uncharted waters for almost 2,000 miles that summer, resulting in the first Chesapeake Bay map, which is still remarkably accurate in our age of satellite imaging.

Concert Cruise to St. Mary's College Provides Great Sail and Performance

Two new SMSA members joined the *Kelly Ann* crew on the July 15-17 cruise to St. Mary's College to attend one of the outstanding Friday night River Concerts. Rick and Midge Kinder on *Pradel* (a 38' Baltic) were on their second SMSA cruise; Renard and Flonet Biltgen on *Wild Goose* (a 43' Shannon) were on their first. One real benefit of having a smaller number of cruisers is the better opportunity to get to know one another. We thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the Kinders and Biltgens, four delightful and seasoned sailors.

Despite hot and threatening weather, the audience was treated to an outstanding concert by the Chesapeake Orchestra and two young and very talented soloists. Soprano Olivia Vote and the orchestra drew a warm response to their performance of Ravel's Scheherazade. Former royal harpist to the Prince of Wales, Catrin Finch and the Orchestra dazzled the audience with a performance of Debussy's *Danse Sacre et Danse Profane*, and Ms. Finch drew two standing ovations for two encores, the loudest for her humorous solo performance of the "Kentucky Fried Chicken Rag". What a valuable resource the River Concert Series is to everyone in Southern Maryland! Admission is free; a donation is requested. You may bring a picnic or purchase food from a variety of excellent vendors. If you have not yet

discovered this summertime jewel, either by water or by land, you're really missing something.

The three SMSA boats remained at the college overnight (two anchored in Horseshoe Bend and the other tied up at the dock.) We enjoyed a great brunch (and air conditioning!) on Saturday at their cafeteria. After escaping the heat as long as possible, cruisers motorsailed across the Potomac to the Coan and dropped our hooks in a protected anchorage near marker 20. The happy hour -- complete with strawberry daiquiris, Midge's to-die-for smoked salmon canapes and other excellent hors d'oeuvres -- was reduced to a happy half hour due to an approaching thunderstorm. Fortunately, we were a group of fast eaters and drinkers. Happily too, the brief storm left us with slightly lower temperatures and a light breeze -- much appreciated after such a blisteringly hot day.

On Sunday morning a southwest wind provided cruisers with a pleasant sail across the Potomac and up past Point No Point. There the temperature and wind headed in opposite directions, so old faithful was cranked up. Motorsailing the last leg to Solomons, *Kelly Ann* was treated to the sight of a large and beautiful fleet of SCREWPILE competitors off Cedar Point.

Easy Time (Ron and Suzie Williams and Tipper) left Solomons at 0837 after fueling at SYC. We saw *Blue Heron* (David and Sally Arbuthnot) preparing to leave and *Calypso* (Frank and Rita Gerred) at their dock, also preparing to leave. The winds were SSE at 10 so we motored south. At the 1000 check-in, *Easy Time* was at the targets. We talked to *Swan* (Ken and Ellie Mowbray), *Little Toot* (Bill Beha), *Nimue* (Ron and Kris Hoile), *Calypso*, and *Blue Heron*. *Nimue* indicated that they were heading from Port Kinsale across the Potomac. *Swan* indicated that they were sailing down the Bay slightly ahead of *Easy Time*. *Little Toot*, *Blue Heron*, and *Calypso* were slightly behind *Easy Time*. *Easy Time* decided to put up

sails and headed across the Bay toward the Eastern Shore. We tacked back about an hour later and had a wonderful sail almost to Point Lookout. We managed to avoid a collision with *Blue Heron* as they were still motoring and headed off. At Point Lookout, everyone put up sails and had a nice sail up the Potomac. *Easy Time* did most of that tack wing-on-wing and then had a broad reach up the St. Mary's. At Horseshoe Bend, we found *Pradel* (Rich and Midge Kinder) anchored.

Easy Time, *Calypso*, *Nimue*, *Pradel*, and *Blue Heron* dinghied ashore to attend a superb concert. While we were ashore, *Mongoose Magic* (Dale and Antha Koonse) arrived in Horseshoe Bend.

On Saturday, we all met at the dock and attended the brunch at St. Mary's College. With omelets, pizza, waffles, ice cream, apple pie, burgers, grits, and lots more, everyone overate. During brunch, we discussed whether or not we would follow our schedule and go to Smith Island. No one voted for Smith so we stayed anchored in Horseshoe Bend. Many of us attended a wonderful piano recital in the afternoon. We then had happy hour on shore with lots of super goodies. Curt and Dottie Hamilton drove down to join us.

On Sunday, *Swan*, *Calypso*, and *Pradel* headed north toward Solomons. *Easy Time*, *Blue Heron*, *Nimue*, *Little Toot*, and *Mongoose Magic* headed toward Tangier. At about Point Lookout, everyone put up sails and, once again, we had a wonderful sail. The wind died before we got to Tangier, so we motored the last few miles. As we approached Tangier, *Koel* (Gresh and Rene Sackett) came into view. We tied up at Parks Marina and had a nice happy hour on *Easy Time*. The winds had shifted to NE, so it was a pleasant cool evening. Mr. Parks' very pregnant granddaughter came by in the evening to collect our slip fees. The next day, Mr. Parks explained to us that she is a very level young lady--the bubble is in the middle.

Monday dawned hot and humid with winds out of the south. Some of us did an early walk, cut short by pending rains. At 1130, we all headed into town for lunch at Hilda Crockett's. Crab cakes, clam fritters, ham, green beans, beats, corn pudding,

apple sauce, homemade bread, slaw, and potato salad were served family style with more available if wanted. Once again, we all overate. During lunch, we decided to go to Onancock on Tuesday rather than to Dividing Creek. The afternoon in Tangier consisted of shopping and napping. Happy hour was held on *Nimue*. Despite a large lunch, everyone brought goodies galore. While we were on *Nimue*, *My Tangier* docked next to us. The captain made it look so easy that we gave loud applause. He, in turn, came over and introduced himself as Dave Crockett and proceeded to play guitar and serenade us with three of his own songs about Tangier and the Bay. We all agreed that he is extremely talented and we certainly enjoyed the impromptu concert.

Tuesday dawned hot and humid. We left Tangier at 0830 with south winds of 10 to 15, headed to Onancock rather than the originally planned Dividing Creek. As we cleared the Tangier, channel, *Blue Heron* radioed to say they had engine problems and were going to head back to Solomons with a good tail wind. The rest of us headed on to Onancock. *Easy Time* was leading; in case we found shallow waters, we were to warn the others. The problem was that Ron had put a route into the computer for the Occohannock Creek instead of the Onancock Creek. Like good lemmings, everyone followed *Easy Time*, head into the 15 knot wind, and on the wrong course. Finally, *Nimue* headed off toward the Onancock and everyone followed them. *Easy Time's* crew wondered where everyone else was going, checked the charts, and found the error. We arrived at the Wharf in Onancock in very hot weather. *Mongoose Magic* choose to anchor out. The rest of us tied up. We spent the afternoon shopping in the marvelous hardware store and the kitchen supply store; and enjoying their air conditioning. We had a happy hour on shore and then headed to Bizzoto's for a gourmet dinner. We all agreed it was excellent. During dinner, *Blue Heron* called to let us know that they arrived home okay, having survived a few storms on the way.

Wednesday we woke to cloudy skies. *Easy Time* left at 0800, headed for Mill Creek on the Great Wicomico. *Mongoose Magic* was right behind, while *Nimue* and *Little Toot* got off at about 0830.

Koel stayed behind waiting on a UPS delivery of a deed they had to sign. *Easy Time* motored down the Onancock and put the sails up as they entered the Bay. *Mongoose Magic* was not far behind. *Nimue* and *Little Toot* were about a half hour back. About two miles into a great sail at 80 degrees on the wind, the winds picked up. We began to see over 20 and then over 25. We fell off and the winds continued to pick up. Finally, we were seeing over 30 and we headed north up Tangier Sound with the wind behind us. *Mongoose Magic* followed *Easy Time* up the sound. We saw true winds up to 40 knots. We radioed *Nimue* and *Little Toot* and they indicated that they were getting hard rains, but winds of only 20 to 25, so they continued on across the Bay to the Great Wicomico. *Easy Time* and *Mongoose Magic* headed back to Tangier. *Mongoose Magic* had the misfortune of having the wind blow them out of the channel as they came into Tangier and they went hard aground. The good news was it was only an hour before low tide, so they did get off, but not for six more hours. After tying up again at Mr. Parks, *Easy Time* talked to *Koel* and *Koel* decided to stay in Onancock. So we had our cruise located in three places on Tuesday night.

On Thursday, it was flat on the Bay. The winds were light and we all motored or motor-sailed to the Coan River. There we found *Kalypso* (Fred Seisseger) already at anchor. It was hot, so *Easy Time*, *Mongoose Magic*, *Nimue*, and *Kalypso* dinghied up the Coan seeking the spot where there were no jelly fish, as the guidebook promised, so we could swim. At one point, we thought we must be there, but, alas, Ron Hoile found a jelly--when it stung him. It seems that the jelly fish have, in fact, invaded the Coan, right up to the the very end. There was no swimming. Happy hour was held on *Easy Time*, under the big awning. *Koel*, coming all the way from Onancock, arrived about a half hour after happy hour began. They were greeted by numerous horns and whistles, including two conch horns and the wonderful brass horn off of *Little Toot* (ask Bill if you might see his horn; it is an antique and it has a great sound).

Kalypso left the Coan, headed for Solomons, at the crack of dawn on Friday. We motored from the

Coan to St Mary's, anchoring well away from the fireworks barge. It was HOT; too hot to do anything. *Swan* and *Calypso* showed up in the early afternoon having sailed from Solomons. At 0515, most of us gathered on shore and went to the fabulous concert. We were joined by the Arbuthnots, Hamiltons, and Schroeders who had driven down. With temps still in the 90's, the concert began with a hearty rendition of "Sleigh Ride" to help us think cool thoughts and it ended with the "1812 Overture" and fireworks.

After a very warn night, *Easy Time*, *Little Toot*, *Koel*, and *Mongoose Magic* headed for home on Saturday morning. *Mongoose Magic* went north up the Potomac and *Easy Time*, *Little Toot* and *Koel* headed for the Bay and the run north to Solomons. The winds increased as we headed down the Potomac and were blowing 15 to 20 out of the north as we rounded Point Lookout. A half hour of pounding and water over the boats convinced *Easy Time* and *Koel* to turn back and head for Smith Creek. *Little Toot* continued on to Solomons.

Meanwhile *Nimue*, *Calypso*, and *Swan* remained in Horseshoe Bend to attend the brunch at the college. *Easy Time* radioed *Nimue* that they were going into Smith Creek, so the three remaining boats joined *Easy Time* and *Koel* later in Smith Creek a fun happy hour was held on *Calypso*.

Easy Time was awake before 0600 on Sunday. A check of NOAA weather promised 10-15 from the east between Drum Point and Smith Point. After taking Tipper to shore, Ron knocked on *Koel* to let them know that *Easy Time* was leaving. On hearing the weather report, *Koel* indicated they would be ready momentarily. *Swan* also planned to leave for Solomons. For *Easy Time*, *Koel*, and *Swan*, it was a wonderful day on the Bay. For once NOAA was right and we sailed all the way home. *Nimue* and *Calypso* stayed in Smith Creek for a few hours and then moved across the Potomac to the Yeocomico for one more night on the hook before returning to their home ports.

While we did not adhere, exactly, to our planned cruise schedule, everyone agreed that it was a fun, interesting, and eventful cruise.
