Planning for SMSA Training is in full swing. This year we will plan to hold a Race Rules Seminar, a Race Management Seminar, and a first aid class.

The Race Rules seminars are given in two sessions immediately following the Spring Frostbite race results. The first session will cover definitions, starting and upwind rules of sailing. The second session will cover mark rounding's and downwind racing rules of sailing.

Whether skipper or crew, anyone who races will gain valuable knowledge that will help you win more races. You will learn when you have the right of way or when you are the stand down boat in any situation on the race course. Skippers will stay out of trouble and out of "the room" when they know with confidence who has the right of way. Crew will be able to inform the skipper of an impending problem before it surprises everyone so a proper course of action can be taken to keep ahead of the pack. Having a thorough understanding of the rules makes you a better competitor, a safer competitor, and a welcome crew on any boat, so come on out and brush up on your rules knowledge and dispel any misconceptions you have.

The Race Management Seminar is always interesting and you will walk away with new insights into race management. If you are new to Race Committee, a seasoned PRO, or a crew member on a race boat you will be sure to benefit from his experience and insights to conducting races. New race committee members will benefit by gaining insights on how to set a course and run a race, giving you the confidence to meet your obligation to serve as race committee for two events this year. If you are a seasoned veteran of race committees you will benefit from the most up to date information and techniques and maybe dispel some bad habits developed over the years or just brush up on some information you may have forgotten over time. If you are a crew on a race boat you will benefit by understanding what is going on, what to expect next, and why it is happening. This will add another dimension to the skills you bring to the boat and make you even more valuable to your race skipper.

We are also holding a CPR/First Aid Training on 18 March 2017. If you have never had a first aid certificate or if your current certificate is expired this seminar is for you. You may not think you need to get CPR/First Aid certified until tragedy hits; you will be glad you attend the seminar and were able to save a loved one or crew mate. There is a minimum attendance requirement to ensure the instructor can cover the time and expenses required to conduct the course so spread the word and I will schedule a course when we have enough interest. The cost for the course is approximately \$50.00



A discussion ensued...should we go anyway? What are we going to do all week...aren't we going to be bored out of our skulls being tourists? The answer is, nope, not with this crew!!

As fall lingered on, the Rhumb Punch girls (and Joe) made their plane reservations. Papa Punch & Shawn Puppy started to think about the long drive (24 hours with a boat!) and if we could shave anytime off without a tow. Wait, what do you mean no boat!?!? 

We leisurely dropped off duffle bags & golf clubs, but didn't worry about sails, greasing hubs, lashing booms, spin poles, or foul weather gear, although we all learned later that each of the boys packed some sailing gear, "just in case"!




The drive and flights down were uneventful (we did not stop at nor are there pictures of South of the Border!!), except for the startling realization that when you are driving to Key West and get to Florida you are only halfway there!! Once south of Orlando, I-95 is flat, straight and borrrring. Easy as pie, and not much traffic at night either... A little jaunt to the west to get onto the Florida Turnpike to avoid Miami and boom, US-1 at Florida City all the way to Key West.

Closely following Papa & Puppy were Mama, LaLa, Joe, Sandy, Mike & Becky Ironmonger, arriving on Friday afternoon. Remember the 24 hours? The Punch Mobile did it in about 20 hours this time around, even at a slightly leisurely pace...Papa was driving slow trying to keep the fuel economy up, which averaged almost 19 MPG over 2,200 miles. We each had our shining moments with a good drive off the tee box, a nice chip or good putt here and there at the country's Southernmost Golf Course. Papa and Shawn got some of the cobwebs out at the driving range on Sunday, but when we played our first round on Monday we still felt sorry for Scott from Texas, the fourth that got paired up with Papa, Puppy & Joe. Scott spent a lot of time sitting in the golf cart while we chased golf balls into the mangroves. 

The remaining crew hopped aboard and headed west for a great morning of fishing with enough in the cooler by noon to enjoy an absolute feast of fresh Yellow Tail and Grey Snapper that evening (our Captain and guide, Jeremy with Sandy after a big Grey Snapper was landed!)






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
